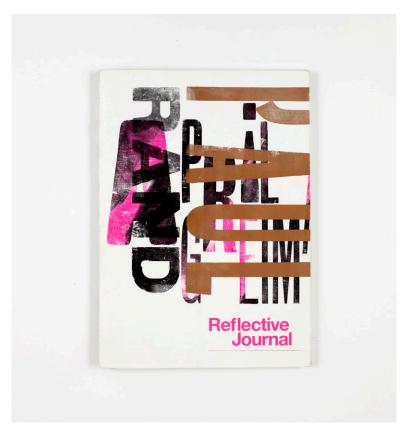

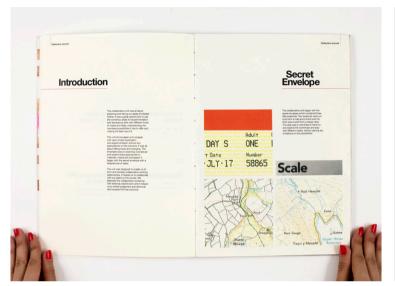

Sheets from the journal documenting my process and development through various printmaking techniques including photo etching and linocut.

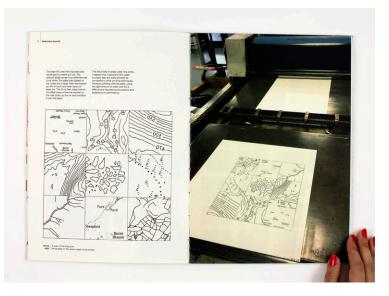

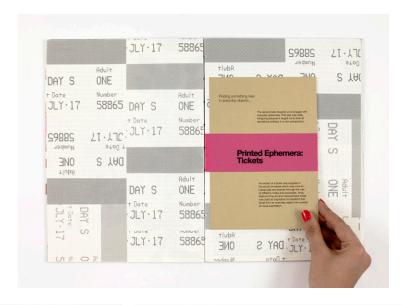
Monoprinting, Screenprinting: Experimental anagram prints made from map fragments/ cut-outs, allowing layering

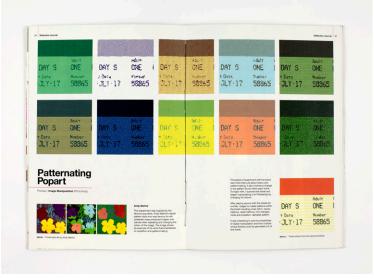

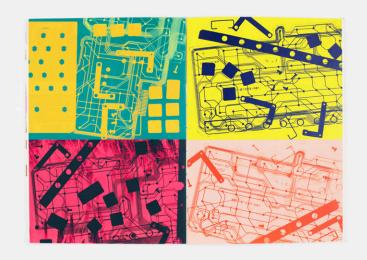




DISASSEMBLE

SEMANTIC TYPOGRAPHY

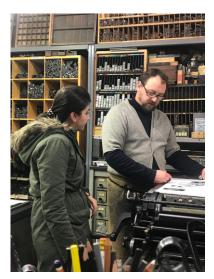
This task was based on using the key word in the secret envelope and considering how it could be manipulated to convey it's meaning without resorting to illustrations or images.

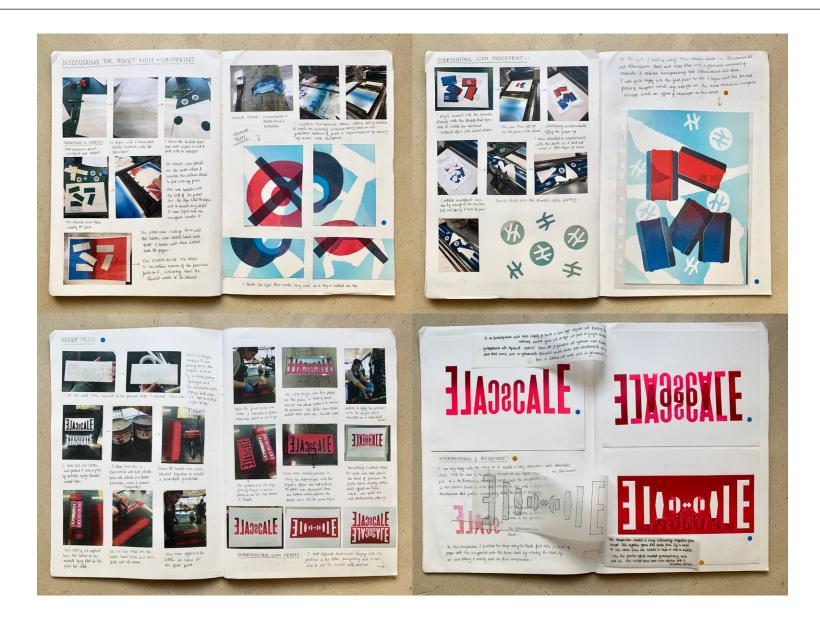
Research & Development: **Sketchbook**
